This collaboration with each team member and with clients is the crucial foundation and culture of his architectural business.

Since growing up in Lacey, Washington, he has always had an interest and appreciation of how things are built and their impact on people. Combined with that interest and appreciation, Sean also has an enormous appreciation for nature, often tying the two together.



"I once wrote an article years ago called 'Forts of all Sorts,'" he laughs, describing childhood days living in a subdivision with a greenbelt where he built all kinds of forts from pieces of the natural surroundings. "We were always back there building things."

As his family home was being built, Sean had the opportunity also to experience the process from the client's perspective, making choices as the homeowner. "These were the beginning stages

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of what formed who I am."

In high school, Sean decided to pursue an education in architecture and embark on the journey of his appreciation for the building process and nature through a career in architectural design. While in college, he also worked in construction to better understand the building process and its impact on the environment and people.

After graduating, he made his way to Bellingham, where he secured a summer internship with a local firm, ultimately, after graduating, was hired as a full-time employee and lived in an apartment above the office.

In 2004, he started his own company, Sean Hegstad Architect,

where he became the design architect of record for Fairhaven Gardens, among other high-profile projects.

"I had an office in the attic of our first home," he laughs.

A long-time resident now of Bellingham and Whatcom County, Sean continues to focus on collaborative design and building residential and commercial projects with his team and clients.

In 2008, with their first office along Harris Avenue in Fairhaven, Sean is continuing to live his dream of creating homes that fit the lives of his clients, including designing his own homes that fit the lifestyle of his growing family throughout the years.

In 2006 they sold their first house in Bellingham and bought five acres north of Bellingham. They built a home for themselves that reflected their lifestyle with young children.

After selling this house as their lifestyle once again changed, Sean designed and built a net-zero energy home in Lynden, which showed the care and effectiveness of that particularly unique design for the area.

With part of the proceeds of selling their home, Sean also built Haven's mixed-use building in Ferndale, which has five apartments as well as their architectural design office.

"This office was an investment for us, as well as a showcase of our work," explains Sean.

The design extends to the culture of collaboration in the office,

making it an enjoyable place to work. As a team of six employees and one intern, they strive to ensure they are giving the clients more than they expect by doing things that are special and unique in a very collaborative way, including working with the contractors early in the process.

Every team member has a different ability and brings a set of skills and strengths to the business. Those abilities and skills are combined to create a solid experience for the clients.

"I appreciate the collaboration that goes on in the office," says Brenda, Drafting Technician, who came to Haven Design Workshop over six years ago from Montana, where she studied architecture. "We listen to our clients, taking in their input and creating what is best for them."

She goes on to say that each of the team members has their own areas of expertise, building on those roles as they work together and always asking, "how can we make this better as a team."

For over seven years, Amy, a team member, concurs and says the open atmosphere of the office makes it ideal for bouncing ideas off of each other.

As the Office Manager and Permit Technician, she says, "I love the challenge of the work and enjoy the great clients we have and making their lives easier through the process."

All of this speaks to what Sean and his team strive to create at Haven Design Workshop.

"We're not looking to be stars with our own designs, but we want to make sure our clients get what they want," says Sean. "How do they live? How do they use the space?
